

Stability and Peace Operations Roundtable

The round table will discuss the situation facing the US Military today in support of peace and stability in Iraq, Afghanistan, Kosovo, and potential engagements in Africa, the Caribbean, Central Asia, and the Mid East. The objectives are to:

- A Acquaint the participants with stability and peace operations as they are being conducted by the US and International Forces either unilaterally, under UN control or under UN sanction in places like Kosovo, Congo, Lebanon, Haiti, Afghanistan, and Iraq.
- B Discuss the concepts and doctrine behind peace and stability operations from the US and multinational perspective. This will include the concepts of conflict termination, post conflict stabilization, reconstruction, counter insurgency and irregular war.
- C Examine the United Nations (UN) response to crisis from the perspective of Humanitarian and Reconstruction as well as peacekeeping.
- D Explore the US Military relationships with Non-Governmental Organizations in Peace Building.
